 Human made resources – hunting and gathering tools which came from the land, animals and plants

 Social structures – families, clans, religious beliefs and values

Colonisation – We Became Poor

- We no longer had access to our resources our land, our animal and plant life, our social structures
- We were denied access to introduced resources
- We became a resource

But

- We fought for and continue to fight for our rightful place and the return or compensation for the loss of our resources
- We survived
